

# Ron's Ramblings

#### What if Jesus had not risen from the grave?

At the heart of the Christian faith is that Jesus rose from the grave on what we call Resurrection Day (Easter Sunday). This fact is what the Apostle Paul calls the truth "of first importance" for the Early Church.

"For what I received I passed on to you as of first importance: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures, and that he appeared to [Peter], and then to the Twelve. After that, he appeared to more than five hundred of the brothers and sisters at the same time, most of whom are still living, though some have fallen

asleep. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles, and last of all he appeared to me also..." (1 Corinthians 15:3-8)

The question to be asked, or course, is what would have happened if Jesus had not risen from the dead?

In 2002 a stone ossuary (bone box) was made public in an article published by *Biblical Archeology Review* magazine. They claimed that the ossuary of James, the brother of Jesus had possibly been

found and that it was inscribed in Aramaic, "James, son of Joseph, brother of Jesus." While the revelation of this artifact caused a stir because it offered historical proof of Jesus' family, the discovery of the bone box also shed some light on first century Jewish burial practices that many around the world had forgotten.

The gospels share the first stage of normal Jewish burial customs from that time. "Joseph bought some linen cloth, took down the body [of Jesus], wrapped it in the linen, and

placed it in a tomb cut out of the rock. He then rolled a stone against the entrance of the tomb." (Mark 15:46)

If Jesus hadn't risen from the grave, the body would then have decomposed and a year

later the family would have returned and lovingly gathered his bones that were laid out in the tomb, and placed them into a stone ossuary inscribed his name on it and placed the bone box in a small burial niche which would have contained other ossuaries of family members who were also buried there.

That's what happened later on to James the brother of Jesus. When tomb robbers stole his ossuary from a first century tomb outside of Jerusalem, they would have seen the bones still inside the bone box after all of these centuries later. That's what archeologists discovered when they found the ossuary of Caiaphas, the High Priest, who had Jesus arrested and sent him to Pilate for Roman trial and crucifixion. Caiaphas' bone box can been seen today in a museum in Jerusalem.

Yet, this was not Jesus' story. The Gospel of Luke recounts that on the third day when Mary Magdalene and a couple of other women went to the tomb, they found the stone outside rolled away and his tomb empty. An angel at the tomb said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; he has risen!" (Luke 24:5-6)

Jesus lives! He arose on the third day. His bones were never put in an ossuary. The resurrection of Jesus interrupted the family burial practices and the plans of Caiaphas. Praise God that we have a living Savior and his name is Jesus Christ!



## Celebrating 100 years!



#### CROP Hunger Walk to be held in Needville on May 4

### Missions/Outreach

Streethearts for Haiti is a mission that Immanuel Evangelical Church has supported for 10 years.



We will have speakers, Wayne Huber and his daughter, Hope, in church April 7 to share their experiences of serving at this mission.

Haiti holds the unenviable position of being the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere. At least 80% of the population lives in poverty, including a large number of street

children.

Street children are defined as children three to sixteen years of age for whom the street has become home. They have lost their families through natural disasters, illness or abandonment due to financial hardship. Abusive, dysfunctional, poverty-stricken dynamics at home often leave little alternative.

Since street children generally do not have protection, supervision or direction, they are vulnerable targets for exploitation, disease and addictions due to hunger and abuse. Typically, they resort to theft and violence as a means to an end. They are frequently exploited sexually, which is a topic not often discussed in Haitian culture. While it may not be "acceptable" it happens constantly.

Streethearts works as a change agent for street kids in Cap-Haitien, Haiti, helping to redirect the course of their lives by providing for fundamental needs along their path from childhood to adulthood. They don't believe in institutionalizing children. Each child steps into an individualized life plan when they enroll. The key to self-improvement starts with each child's acceptance of who he is and developing his plan for the future.



#### There are three phases of Streethearts:

Night Shelters - Establishing a Home: The Night Shelter; the most basic care for those 14 and under who have not yet chosen to leave the street life behind. Each evening, they can enter the Phase One facility and be given a bed and locker. These are given on a 1st come, 1st serve basis. The boys receive a meal each evening if they come in before 8:30 PM – this is an incentive to get them off the streets early.

Heart House - Earning an Education: The Children's Center; Boys aged 6-15 who have shown commitment to leaving the street life behind can move into our Phase Two center. In Phase Two, the boys are enrolled in school. They live at the facility full-time and are responsible for helping run the house. They participate in sports and fine arts activities depending

on their interests and are expected to complete one community service project each



**Transition Program -** *Entering the Workforce*: The Young Leader's Apartment Complex; boys aged 16-21 enter into the apartment complex where they gain guided independence in preparation for graduation at 21. The same programs are offered as in Phase Two at a more advanced level. At this stage, the boys are being prepared to have the skills to live as contributing members of their community with the goal of impacting Haiti in a positive way.
